Our first order of 33 pavers has been placed and should be shipped September 21! There will be fifteen 12X12 pavers commemorating the first families from 1835 to 1935. Each of these pavers will feature the family name and the footprints symbol. These early family names are: Destin, Marler, Melvin, Jones, Woodward, Shirah, Maltezo, Brunson, Taylor, Calhoun, Kelly, Walter, O'Neal, Chambless, and Wells. Additional 4X8 or 8X8 pavers may be purchased to honor a family member, special event, business, charter boat, or organization. Captain John A. Destin



Pioneers of Paradise

The Destin Family

In the spring of 1835, Leonard Destin, Sr., his father George, youngest brother William and their crew left their home port of New London, Connecticut to explore the new frontier along the Florida coast. They were ever looking to expand their fishing grounds. In September, as they sailed off the coast of Cape Canaveral, a severe storm came up. George and William were lost during the storm. After a time, Leonard continued to sail around the coast of Florida and into the Gulf of Mexico. He arrived at an area marked on their charts as East Pass, which was in fact a small pass into a sheltered lagoon. Leonard's experience and knowledge of the sea, along with the beauty of this place encouraged him to drop anchor. This was, without a doubt, the most beautiful area he had seen in his 22 years on earth. With sand so white it was blinding, water clear enough to see the bottom at 40 ft. and teeming with every imagined species of marine life, he realized the potential here for abundant fishing. Leonard and his crew soon established their fish camp near a large magnolia tree on the lagoon, which provided some shelter from the elements. Leonard's schooner, the "Hempstead", was too large to be used for fishing close to the beach in the shallow water, so they made use of their dingy, rowing out the East Pass and into the Gulf. These small wooden boats were known as "yawls", easily powered with long oars called "sweeps". The seine nets used were hand made from cotton yarn. The fish that were caught were held in pens in the water to keep them fresh until they had enough to sail them to market in Pensacola. The "Hempstead" served very well in this effort.


Leonard had soon established a fishing business that provided a living generous enough that he felt ready to take a wife. In 1845, with the help of his crew, when they were not fishing, Leonard built a fine home on the shore of Choctawhatchee Bay just north of his fish camp. In 1852, he married Martha McCollum from South Carolina. Their first son, George, who was named after Leonard's father, was born January 7, 1853. The couple were blessed with six children. The four boys were George, Leonard Jr., Andrew and Alfred. The two girls were Jane and Hattie. By the late 1800s. Martha's parents had also come to live with them. Approximately 20 other settlers lived in this small area now known as Moreno Point Mili-

tary Reservation.






Legendary Marine Held Their 3rd Annual Destin Swordfish Shootout June 16 to 18

The Museum benefitted from the raffle held the night of the Captain's Meeting at the Emerald Grande and received \$770.



Goldbrickers Unmasked As Refurbishers of Destin Community Center

The slang term "goldbricker" referred to a person who would avoid assigned duties or work, a shirker and a

goldbrick referred to a brick shaped block that looked like gold, but wasn't. Well, the Destin version of a goldbricker was much different. In April of 1974, the Community Center was in need of renovation to meet the needs of the community...which meant the need for about \$10,000...a tremendous amount of money. A committee lead by Bill Burleson, a member of the Destin Family, came up with a campaign to sell 400 "gold-plated" bricks for \$25 each and raise the needed money for the project. Local volunteers were assigned portions of Destin, both business and residential, and planned to complete their drive in 10 days. Cost of this project totaled less than \$25 as materials and services were donated. Bumper stickers and decals saying, "I am a GOLDBRICKER" were donated by Martin Townsley, bricks donated by Brant Kelly and Wee Wood Lumber, the gold-spraying was done by Page & Sons Sandblasting & Welding which had lettering that read: "GOLDBRICKER, Destin Community Center Renovation, 1974". Architectural work for the renovation was donated by Ida Scott. Those that made goldbrick donations received an actual goldbrick, a decal to place on their car, names published in the newspaper, posted at the Community Center and recognized at the fish fry held to celebrate the completion of the building renovation that 4th of July.

When the first public meeting opened, the stage was set with piles of "gold" bricks guarded by a uniformed Marine. Before the first meeting closed \$1,200 was raised. In the ten days to come goldbricks would be purchased by those wanting to make a memorial to those that had brought Destin to what it was in those days.

Today this "Goldbricker's" exhibit is included in the Old Post Office located across the street from the Museum. Many other great stories of Destin's early struggle to govern itself are located in the Old Post Office.
